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Why are there few women in tech?

- 🐾 Girls are discouraged from tinkering from childhood
 - 🐾 Seeing few people like yourself leads to imposter syndrome
 - 🐾 Sexism
- 🐾 While there are 15-20% women in tech, there are at best 11% women in free software

- 👣 This is a matter of fairness to address the imbalance created by society and offer the opportunities to people to participate
- 👣 More contributors with diverse experiences

Awards

- 👣 Visibility and recognition of accomplished women inside and outside the community
- 👣 Red Hat Women in Open Source Award



Outreach Works

- 👣 PyCon 2014 had 33% women speakers and attendees
- 👣 GUADEC 2014 has 11% women speakers and 13% women attendees
- 👣 GSoC participation by women increased from 7.1% in 2011 to 9.8% in 2014
- 👣 20 OPW alums had full-session talks at FOSS conferences
- 👣 16 OPW alums found employment or contracts with sponsoring organizations
- 👣 14 OPW alums were accepted for GSoC or Hacker School

Create a welcoming environment

- 👣 Break the unicorn law - read the available resources, rather than asking women who are not working on improving diversity about lack of diversity
- 👣 Use gender-neutral language
- 👣 Speak up if someone is being sexist
- 👣 Get communities, conferences, and events you participate in to adopt a code of conduct
- 👣 Host Ada Initiative Ally Skills Workshop at your organization or community



Help fight imposter syndrome

- 👣 Don't express surprise at someone's lack of knowledge
- 👣 Speak about how you learned, uncertainties and failures on the way
- 👣 Make knowledge needed to participate in your project explicit
- 👣 Encourage questions, mentorship
- 👣 Offer encouragement, praise
- 👣 Host Ada Initiative Imposter Syndrome Training in your organization or community



Reach out

- 🐾 Post job announcements to Syssters, DevChix, OPW opportunities, other women groups
- 🐾 Send invitations to events to local university women in CS lists and women in tech groups
- 🐾 Volunteer at an OpenHatch or Software Carpentry workshop
- 🐾 Organize a skills workshop for women for your project, possibly in collaboration with PyLadies, Women Who Code
- 🐾 Get FOSS organization you are involved with to participate in OPW
- 🐾 Become a mentor in OPW



Increase women's visibility

- 👣 Make sure everyone has a chance to speak at meetings
- 👣 Amplify voices and accomplishments in discussions and on social media
- 👣 Encourage to blog, submit talks, become a mentor
- 👣 Propose as keynote speakers and panelists
- 👣 Nominate for awards like Free Software Award, O'Reilly Open Source Award, Red Hat Women in Open Source Award




Provide financial support

- 👣 Support paid work on improving diversity – this work should not be a second shift for underrepresented people
 - 👣 Employ people who are working on diversity initiatives
 - 👣 Donate to the Ada Initiative, GNOME Foundation, Software Freedom Conservancy, OpenHatch
- 👣 Sponsor women's events, skills workshops, travel scholarships, internships, and immersion programs
